 - New York v. Trump
- Northern District of California/Ninth Circuit
 - Regents of the University of California v. DHS

 - San Jose v. Trump

- District of D.C./D.C. Circuit
 - NAACP v. Trump

Current Court Orders Maintaining DACA Renewals

- Regents (N.D. Cal.): Preliminary Injunction Issued on January 9, 2018
 - Injunction affirmed by Ninth Circuit on November 8, 2018
- Batalla Vidal v. Trump (E.D.N.Y.): Preliminary Injunction issued on February 13, 2018
 - Appeal pending before Second Circuit
- NAACP v. Trump (D.D.C.): Order vacating DACA Rescission Issued April 24, 2018
 - Order Reaffirmed by District Court on August 4, 2018
 - Order Narrowed to Parallel Preliminary Injunctions on August 17, 2018
 - Appeal pending before D.C. Circuit, Argument to be held February 22, 2019

Pending Petitions for Certiorari

- · Petition for Certiorari
 - Regents v. DHS (originally filed as certiorari before judgment)
- Certiorari Before Judgment
 - · Batalla Vidal v. Trump
 - · NAACP v. Trump
- Next SCOTUS conference: February 15, 2019

CASA de Maryland v. Trump

• District court ruled for government on challenge to DACA rescission

BUT

- Injunction preserving DACA informationsharing/privacy protections
 - DACA excluded from recent changes to USCIS NTA policies
- Cross appeals pending, oral argument held on December 11, 2018



What about Texas's lawsuit against DACA?

- Texas led a group of states, arguing that DACA is unlawful
- Defendant-Intervenors Perez, et al., and state of NJ because federal agencies would not defend DACA's legality
- Preliminary injunction denied on August 31, 2018
- Trial date set for May 2020

Who is eligible to apply?

All individuals who were previously granted DACA can apply, including:

- People whose DACA case expired at any time;
- People whose DACA case was terminated; and
- · People whose current DACA will expire.



Filing DACA Renewals

- Applicants whose DACA expired on or before September 5, 2016 must file as Initials
 - Show physical presence on June 15, 2012
 - Must show continuously resided in United States since June 15, 2007
- Applicants whose DACA expires September
 5, 2016 to now, can file as Renewals

DACA Application Packet

- Form I-821D
- Form I-765
- Form I-765WS
- Photocopy of your work permit (both sides)
- · Two identical passport-style photographs
- Filing fee of \$495 on a check or money order payable to U.S. Department of Homeland Security

Processing DACA Applications

- Applications filed as "initials" are being approved
- Renewals are being processed within 2-3 months of filing, with some exceptions
- Applicants still being approved even with law enforcement contact
- DACA recipient information not being shared with ICE for enforcement purposes

Unsure if you should file a Renewal?

- Those who remain in DACA "status" and/or file to renew before any litigation cancels the program may be grandfathered in to the program
- Newer USCIS policy of issuing notices to appear in immigration court do not apply to DACA applicants
- There are agencies covering filing fees for DACA recipients.

What happens to my work permit?

Work permits remain valid until expiration date- no need to update with employer unless they ask. Your employer cannot ask you about DACA or your immigration case.

What about my SSN?

Social security number is valid for life - even if your status changes. Some cards have a condition requiring work authorization.

 - · Physical Presence
 - Education
 - · Work History
 - · Community Involvement
 - · Family Relationships
- Save money for future filing fees & legal fees

Why get a legal consultation?

DACA recipients may be eligible for another immigration benefit and not know it.

15+% of those DACA-eligible found to be potentially eligible for other relief.

Legal Consultation

Get a Legal Consultation:

Explore alternative forms of status now!

Your situation or the law might have changed since your last consultation.

If eligible, request documents and prepare applications- begin process while still have DACA due to processing times.

Next Steps: Advocates

- ☐ Identify DACA recipients in your database and contact them for a consult- do not wait until a change to DACA!
- ☐ Conduct individual consultations screening for all forms of possible relief
- □ Determine if client was in removal proceedings or if they have a final order of removal or deportation
- ☐ Request relevant documents

Next Steps: Advocates

Gather relevant documents:

Do FOIA request for copy of file from one of the relevant DHS agencies.

ILRC FOIA guide:

- ☐ Do FOIA with immigration court system (EOIR) and call telephonic system (1-800-898-7180) for immigration court case information.
- Conduct FBI or state criminal background check for any criminal or other history
- Request file from prior legal representative



Next Steps: Advocates

- Think broadly
- Update your screening or intake form to capture relevant information
- Discuss or train staff on what to look for
- Refer to employment-based or other experts as needed

Legislative Update



History & Brief Recap of the 115th Congress

- Dream Act legislation dates back to 2001, and reintroduced as standalone and part of comprehensive legislative packages
- Numerous bills introduced in House and Senate in 2017 and 2018
 - Dream Act of 2017 (S. 1615, H.R. 3440)
- Series of votes in Senate in February 2018 and in House in June 2018
- Status quo remains with DACA renewals and no legislation signed into law

Legislation in the 116th Congress

- New Congress in 2019 with a split in majority between the House & Senate
- Legislation must pass both houses and be signed by the President
- Expect Dream legislation to be introduced early this year
- New legislation is also expected to cover Temporary Protected Status (TPS)
- Check back with the ILRC for updates through our website and social media

Conditional Permanent

- Conditional Permanent Residence (CPR)
- Entered the U.S. before the age of 18
- Entered the U.S. 4 years prior to date of law's enactment and continuously, physically present in U.S. since that date
- Is not subject to enumerated inadmissibility grounds and other criminal bars
 Some waivers are available
- Admitted to higher education institution; earned high school diploma or GED; or enrolled in secondary school or an education program in order to obtain a high school diploma or to pass GED exam
- CPR status valid for 8 years
- · Includes DACA recipients

Dream Act of 2017

- Lawful Permanent Residence (LPR)
 - Obtained higher education degree or completed at least 2 years towards degree in the U.S.; served in the military for at least 2 years; or employed for at least 3 years
 - · Hardship exceptions apply
 - Same bars apply
 - Has not abandoned U.S. residence
- After 5 years, can apply to become a U.S. citizen
